ACT Prep Workshop



wenty-one Clinton High seniors and teacher John Robinson joined students from five other East
Tennessee Gear Up high schools on
September 12th for an ACT Prep Workshop hosted by Walters State in Claiborne
County. The event was organized by Danny Satterfield of Union County High School as

an effort to prepare students academically and mentally for the October 3rd senior ACT retake. "This was a great opportunity for our students to see that other seniors around the state are working hard on ACT and feeling the same pressure they are to raise their scores. Being college ready takes a lot of effort and we want to

encourage our kids every way we can," said Anderson County GEAR UP site coordinator Hoppy Merryman. Students had the opportunity to attend workshops for each ACT subtest as well as sessions on goal setting and keeping their emotions in check in response to scores and expectations. Andrew Akens said he left inspired realizing

"when trying to reach success you have go further and punch through the goal. Success isn't a destination, it's a process." "It's the process that's gonna get you there", added CHS student Emma Solomon. Free tutoring is available to all seniors at CHS and ACHS to prepare to make their best scores on October 3rd.

Clinton City Schools Receives Top Score in Student Growth on TN Ready

ach year, districts and schools are held accountable for several metrics. Two of the most common measurements are student achievement and student growth. TVAAS is the term used to show how much students grow academically each year. The expectation is to grow students at least one year in each subject. This metric is measured by taking a student's NCE (normal curve equivalent) from one year and comparing it to the next year. If this number stays the same, then this student achieved one year's growth. If it increases, the student made more than a year's growth. For example, if a student had a 51 normal curve equivalent score as a fourth grader and ended the fifth grade year with a 51 normal curve equivalent score that student would have earned one year's growth.

Districts are rated on a scale of 1-5

based on this data with a 5 being the greatest number for growth. Clinton City Schools received a district-wide composite score of a Level 5 on the new TN Ready assessment. This score means that there was statistically significant evidence that our students made and exceeded the expectation of one year's growth. Typically, TVAAS scores are based on 4th, 5th, and 6th grade data. However, since there was no state testing in 2016, scores this year are based only on 5th and 6th grade scores.

Director Kelly Johnson stated, "We are very proud of our growth progress this past year. This is evidence that teachers differentiate instruction to meet the needs of all students in the classroom to ensure that everyone is growing academically. Throughout the year, we use a variety of assessment measurements to track

the growth of our students and adjust instruction accordingly. Due to the size of our system, this metric can sway on extreme ends of the spectrum very easily. Every student counts! We will celebrate this achievement and place our focus on continuing to take students at their current level of instruction and move them along the spectrum as far as possible."

Achievement data should be available towards the end of October. This data will inform parents of their student's performance level in reading, mathematics, and science. No scores will be issued for social studies because the assessment was a field test last year. Scores have been delayed this year since TN Ready is a new test and cut scores have been redefined at the state level. Parent reports are expected by the end of October.

3-D Printing Enhances Learning at CES!

TEM is a large focus in Clinton Elementary's sixth grade program. This year, students were welcomed into sixth grade with two new 3-D printers in Mrs. O'Dell's room, an exceptional teacher of social studies and science. This year, students will be applying their math skills experimenting with Science concepts to develop a deep understanding of standards. To get students oriented to the 3-D printers, students worked with a computer imaging program to create a figure. Once their idea was completed on the computer program, they used the 3-D printer to bring their vision into life!

The 3-D printers also allow Mrs. O'Dell to create models for teaching science concepts. Early in the year, she created a 3-D skull model from the printer. If she purchased a similar product from an educational company, it would have cost approximately \$50.00. However, her 3-D model was created for only a few dollars! The printers have advanced tremendously over the past few years. The level of detail in the sculptures is amazing!

Students will be utilizing the printers throughout the year as science and math concepts are explored. If you want to see engaged and excited students, who regularly practice critical, analytical, and creative thinking, come see us! The 3-D printers are just one tool that we use to deepen the learning of our students!






