## The Building of Excellence

A Brief History of Clinton City Schools

Achieving excellence does not simply happen. Successful institutions have a strong history of fighting for what it right, standing up for certain beliefs, and overcoming obstacles and strife. Today, approximately 950 students enter the buildings of Clinton City Schools where students, parents, and the community are assured that each child will experience a quality education because of the "Tradition of Excellence." To appreciate the benefits of Clinton's highly effective school system, one must have knowledge of the sacrifices and decisions that created the path to success.

Clinton City Schools was founded in 1895, but not without debate. The ordinance to create a municipal city school system ended in a tie vote by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen who voted three votes in favor and three votes opposed for opening a city school system. The mayor's vote broke the tie. At that time, the mayor had no idea the lasting impact his vote would have on the City of Clinton.

Clinton City Schools opened initially with one school, called Clinton Grammar School, which

housed a staff of approximately six employees and 200 students. At the time it opened, it was a segregated school where fifty to one hundred black students attended Green McAdoo, located behind Clinton Elementary School on Coward Street.


During the first years of Clinton Grammar School, heat was provided by coal stoves, pails of water were carried in daily, and kerosene lamps provided the light. At one time during the Great Depression, parents of students grew gardens to help provide fresh vegetables for lunch.

During the 1950s and 1960s, Clinton City Schools experienced a great amount of change. In 1955, North Clinton Elementary School opened with six teachers. In 1962, the old Clinton Grammar School was torn down and replaced with the current Clinton Elementary School. Finally, in 1965, the Board of Education voted to close Green McAdoo School and Clinton City Schools became desegregated. The South Clinton Elementary School building was completed in 1985 and was consolidated as part of Clinton City Schools.

Today, Clinton City Schools is comprised of three elementary

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schools that employ approximately 135 staff members.

Currently, Clinton City
Schools motto is "Tradition of
Excellence" which accurately represents both the past and present, and exemplifies pride in being a small school system that provides a personal educational experience for each child through high expectations and systematic support.

Being a Pre-K through 6th grade school system allows the

opportunity to focus on quality elementary instruction. Clinton Schools is consistently recognized as a statewide leader in academic achievement. Currently, the system ranks 2nd in Reading and Math out of the 20 surrounding districts in the region. When compared to the state, the system ranks 18th in Reading and Math in comparison to 144 Tennessee districts. Clinton Elementary School has had the honor of being a state recognized "Reward School" on four separate occasions in the

last five years. A recently implemented 1:1 technology program called "Technology for Learning" provides a Chrome Book to each 4th -6th grader. Truly, Clinton City Schools is a school system and

community that puts students at the forefront of decision making.

The road to success was paved by many outstanding individuals who dedicated their career to seeing Clinton City Schools soar to greatness. Proof of success is that third and fourth generation students come through the doors. With a focus and dedication to continuous improvement, Clinton City Schools honor the past and continue the strong legacy of a quality education for all students.

#### **T4L Program at Clinton City**

"Technology for Learning."

Clinton City Schools had the vision, and the City of Clinton was there to support it! The goal was to make the system 1:1, meaning that each student in the intermediate grades would have their own digital device to support learning the grade level standards. Less than two years later, Clinton City Schools has met the goal in grades 3-6, with the focus moving towards more devices in the lower grades.

In third grade, there is a class set of Chrome-Books that students use throughout the school year in his/her classroom. In fourth grade, a Chrome Book is issued to each student, and it becomes his/her device for fourth, fifth, and sixth grades. At the end of the student's sixth grade year, the ChromeBook becomes their personal device and goes home. Yes, the students get to take them home to keep!

During the school day, visitors will see students participating in interactive lessons that are teacher initiated and controlled, creating power points and movies, researching topics, and writing essays. The possibilities are endless! Best of all, visitors will see students engaged and excited about learning. Teachers have received an abundance of training on using technology, specifically Google Apps for Education, to enhance the learning experience. Many times, students teach adults about computers!

This program would not be possible without the support of the City of Clinton. For many years, City Council has supported the sixth grade laptop program. They welcomed the opportunity to expand this program to include multiple grades, touching the lives of many more students for an extended time. There is no better experience than seeing students' eyes light up when it is time to bring out their personal device. After all, Clinton is educating digital natives. Clinton City Schools recognizes that learners have evolved and efforts must continue to meet their individual needs to make them productive members of society.

In an effort to be closer to home, I transferred to Powell Elementary School in 1999 where I taught 4th and 5th grade.

Briefly, I took a position in pharmaceutical sales and quickly realized that my passion was in elementary education. With that realization, I went



back to school to earn a Masters in Administration and School Leadership at Lincoln Memorial University. After graduating with a Masters, I served as Assistant Principal and Principal at Powell Elementary School as well as Elementary Supervisor for Knox County Schools for a total of seven years.
