One taking the test, CMCCA 8th Grader, Addison Del Carmen said, "The ACT was definitely an experience I will never forget. I believe every student should take every practice that the Anderson County School system provides for free...I know a lot of students believe that they don't need to take the test this early, but high school is just next year! In my experience the ACT was very stressful, even the practice was very serious and intense. In the past, I've learned the more prepared that you are the more easy obstacles come. Honestly, I was stressed the entire time, and I feel like I was unprepared to answer 65 questions in 40 minutes, but I think that's just something I have to get used to. I will most definitely be taking any and all future ACT practice tests. Practice makes perfect or at least progress!"

CCS Receives Highest Ranking in Student Growth

or the past several weeks, a variety of accountability data, both district and school-based, has been released from the Tennessee Department of Education regarding student results on the annual TN Ready assessment. There are two main areas of accountability achievement and student growth. Achievement is the percentage of students who score on track or mastered in terms of meeting standards. Student growth (TVAAS or Value-Added) is a measurement of much a student grew academically in the course of one year.

Districts and schools are rated on a score of 1-5, with 5 showing "statistical significance" that students made more than a year's growth. Clinton City Schools received a district composite score of a 5 this year, which is the highest ranking possible. This composite score takes all subjects and combines them into one overall score. Individual schools also received a composite score. Clinton Elementary and South Clinton Elementary received a composite score of 5, and North Clinton Elementary received a composite score of 3. A level three means that a year's growth was met. Director Kelly Johnson stated, "We are very proud of our student growth scores based on 2018 TN Ready data. The composite score of a level 5 is proof that teachers differentiate instruction to meet the varying levels of our students. Many of our students come through the classroom doors with standards already mastered so it is our obligation to take each student where they are and grow them academically at least one year. Parents, teachers, administrators, students, and community members have all had their hand in achieving this

ranking."

In terms of achievement, Clinton City Schools also performed well this year. Out of 144 districts, the 6th grade cohort was ranked 3rd in the state in Math and 2nd in the state in English/Language Arts. Our 3-5th grade cohorts are in the top 15% of districts across the state. The "Tradition of Excellence" at Clinton City Schools continues by holding high expectations with an abundance of support.

CHS Alumni Graduates From MIT

hen CHS foreign language teachers returned this fall they found the student had become the teacher. Dylan Stiles, a 2014 CHS graduate, is now writing programs for Duolingo the world's most popular way to learn a language. After graduating in June 2018 from MIT in Boston, the world's top university according to QS World University Rankings, Stiles had multiple job offers but chose Duolingo.

"I interned with Appboy and I even have the code on my phone to change the lights on a Times Square building, but I actually avoided the city. There are too many people there and the movies were expensive," said Stiles. "I thought education might be a better way to give back to society."

As humble as he is intelligent, Stiles offers his advice to high school students- "You can have a dream school, but don't get your hopes up for a dream school. Apply to a bunch. Play the numbers game. I got into MIT and Princeton but not into Vandy and Duke. In high school, take AP and rigorous classes if you want a chance at a top school. Be involved in competitions in clubs (Stiles was a state winner in FBLA and a competitor with First Robotics at CHS) because the playing field isn't equal at all high schools. My friends took 16 AP classes, CHS offered 3. While I don't think these are the most appropriate measures they are the measures so be sure you have high grades and get good test scores if you want a chance at a top school." While Stiles topped out at 36 on the ACT math, he could never get in the 30s on the reading subtest, but that didn't hold him back. He applied to MIT and other top schools through a program called Questbridge which seeks to find high achieving students in low income areas.

"Because MIT matches your demonstrated need 100% I actually paid less than I would have paid to attend the University of Tennessee," says Stiles

When asked about how it feels to send your child off to a big city, Dylan's mom, Beth Duncan, says," The worst words Dylan ever spoke

to me were 'Mom, if I get in MIT I am going'. These were also the best words. I had some anxiety until we visited with GEAR UP and I saw he was in his element. Parent meetings at the preview weekend helped me see that the campus was safe. We have to step back and let our children follow their dreams . My children were first generation college students and I knew nothing about college. I am glad I was able to step back and let them go. " Dylan's sister, Hannah, recently just graduated from the University of Tennessee.

Stiles realized early on into his college career that he would not be coming home to work after graduation.



However, he says there may be a possibility in the future of him being able to return to Tennessee to work remotely. For now, he is in the Pittsburg area writing programs that are being used through Duolingo at Clinton High School, as well as in countries around the globe. As a college student, Stiles studied Japanese and Chinese while earning his Bachelor's degree in Computer Science and Engineering. "I just thought language was interesting", he says. Now he makes it interesting for the next generation of students.

NMS Partners Up With Crayola and TerraCycle

ixth grade Norris Middle School students in Technology class with Mrs. Jones are responsible for collecting and sorting the school's recycling. In addition to collecting regularly recyclable items such as cardboard, cans, and paper, Norris Middle has partnered with Crayola and the TerraCycle Company to collect items that are typically not recyclable and help reduce the school's

environmental impact.

Through these efforts, NMS collected nearly 500 markers last year that were shipped to Crayola and converted to liquid fuel.

This is a wonderful way to teach students the value of recycling and how it helps our world!

n Monday, August 13, Clinton Elementary School (CES) welcomed a small group of parents and students from Japan. A local resident (born and raised in Japan) asked CES to provide some visiting friends a glimmer into the culture of a traditional school in the United States. In education, we call this impromptu exchange a "teachable moment."

There were some interesting comparisons made by both Clinton City Schools and our Japanese visitors. The Japanese adults and students were intrigued by our low student/teacher ratios and large physical classroom size. Japanese students and teachers are accustomed to 30-40 students in a classroom that is not as spacious as classrooms in our district. While walking the halls and visiting classrooms, an excited interest in the visual representations of our district's "Growth Mindset" philosophy was evident.

Many pictures were taken of teacher made posters, banners, and other visual cues related to Growth Mindset. An appreciation for student work (both artistic and academic) was also noted. Evidently, such visual accompaniments are not common practice in Japan. The guests took particular note of the cleanliness of the school. In Japan, the students are involved in the general cleaning of the schools, including bathrooms, garbage, and sweeping.

Opening our CES doors to such interesting guests began as a gesture of good will-just being a good neighbor. The reward for opening our doors and spending a bit of time with folks that appreciate our school so much was invigorating. We indeed live in a wonderful community that values educating all children providing high expectations according to individual needs.



CCS Begins Blaze Project H20

Project H2O will begin its inaugural year in October 2018. This after-school club will be held in all three schools for 1st and 2nd grade students. Angela Teffeteller, 1st grade teacher at South Clinton Elementary School, will spear head this project for CCS. Mrs. Teffeteller completed the ORAU course Project WET (Water Education for Teachers) this summer and received her certificate to be a Project WET educator. Project WET is a National Science and Technology Association (NSTA) recommended curriculum.

Mrs. Teffeteller believes students who are exposed to hands-on science learning will be empowered to make a difference in their world. "Since we are educating students for careers that are not yet defined, we need to allow students to explore and discover science concepts through fun and engaging experimentation. Water is essential to all life and if we teach our elementary students to value this resource, we can truly help define the 21st century", stated Mrs. Teffeteller.

Blaze Project H2O is designed to allow students to explore environmental science, physical science, life science, earth science, conservation, health, math, as well as a bit of geography and history. The activities and experiments will intertwine several subject focuses. Project H20 looks different from your typical classroom experience. Students will use

science lab materials to initiate curiosity, listen to storytelling to encourage thinking, integrate the arts to communicate thinking and solutions, and use interpersonal skills to work in groups to test hypothesis and generate conclusions. All of the highly interactive activities focus on one of our greatest natural resources – water. Plans for expanding this after-school club to higher grade levels are in the works for next year. A special thanks to 3M, a Clinton Manufacturer, for awarding a grant to CCS to make this project possible!






